

Project Update: January 2016

This month, I finalised the results of my camera trap study, which was largely funded by the Rufford Foundation small grant. I prepared a report that I delivered to the Gorongosa Restoration Project and the management team of Gorongosa National Park. The 61-page report was titled, “Wildlife distribution and activity around settlements in Gorongosa National Park, Mozambique: A preliminary camera trapping assessment of Muaredzi and Muanza-Baixo.”

This report included all information gathered during my camera trapping assessment, including anecdotal observations, summaries of the camera trap data, discussion of feasibility of different methods, preliminary analyses on the effects of settlement on wildlife, and recommendations for future research directions. Since circulating the report, I have been engaged in conversations with the science and management team about potential future research directions and management implications of the study.
